It goes beyond mere reporting of events or news and instead provides a detailed examination and evaluation of the issue.

#### purpose

This format involves extensive research, critical thinking, and expert opinions to provide the reader with an in-depth understanding of the topic. Analysis pieces often aim to provide insights into the issue at hand and its broader implications, offering readers a new perspective on the subject. In a time when information is abundant but often fragmented and shallow, an analysis offers readers a more comprehensive view of the world around them.

#### checklist

- Begin by clearly defining the topic you will be analysing.

Collect as much relevant information as possible, including background information, data, and expert opinions. This will help you build a well-informed and well-supported analysis.

- Analyse the information you've collected and identify the most important points that support your argument. These key points will form the basis of your analysis. At the end, draw conclusions.
- Use data, quotes, and other evidence to support your key points. This will make your analysis more convincing and authoritative.
